## DMS PEACE WALK

October is National Anti-Bullying Month. We are so excited that this year will mark our 4th annual Peace Walk. During this month, we will focus on how we all do random acts of kindness in and beyond our school building. Every year, our students rally together to raise money and bring awareness to the importance of being kind through all of our actions. The walk promotes self-esteem, brings us together as a family, and helps boost self-confidence.

Each year, we raise money for local charities like the Cape Coral Caring Center and the Pancreatic Cancer Foundation, as well as many yearly rewards for our outstanding students, and provide motivational speakers to come in and inspire our students to excel. Last year our students raised $\$ 11,000$. Quite the record-breaker, when each were challenged to raise a minimum of $\$ 10$. This year our goal is $\$ 12,000$. These donations should be turned into your student's first period teacher. We want our students to realize that promoting peace and kindness is always a priority at our school.

This year's Peace Walk will take place on Friday, October 18th. Students will participate in a Peace Walk around our track while listening to music through our school's sound system. In addition, any student who raises $\$ 30$ or more will be able to participate in a Color Run on the same day as the Peace Walk that will take place before or after our main track
event. The 5K Color Run will include a grand finale water slide with a pool at the end, so make sure to bring a change of clothes to school if your student plans on taking part in this challenge.

Why do we have a Peace Walk? "Our school decided several years ago that we were going to focus on peace and just being kind to ourselves, to each other, and the world," states Mrs. Bennington. She believes that "we get out of life what we put into it. So if we are working toward being kind, we will get rid of and push out the negative things like the picking-on and bullying of others. Mr. Hutcherson and Youth Leadership Collective partner with parents, educators and other organizations to heal despair in teens. Through Youth Leadership, Will Hutcherson is able to offer dynamic assemblies that focus on making positive choices. It is their mission to equip parents, educators, and mentors with tools such as media and on-site training events for impacting young adults.

This bill requires us to have a link to the FortifyFL site on devices issued to students. I want to let all of you know that within the next few days the FortifyFL icon will show on all student Chrome books.

FortifyFL is a tool students (and anyone in the community) can access to report suspicious activity. By accessing FortifyFL, students can provide a description of the threat, share pictures and video and optionally submit their contact information.

## Being in school is important

It is important that our students are in school everyday and that they are on time for each class, including the beginning of the day. Just as students receive a detention during the day for being tardy to classes, students will also receive a detention on every third unexcused tardy to school. Therefore, every 3rd unexcused tardy will result in an after school detention.

Morning Open Gym- Parent Convenience If your morning schedule is tight, you may use our open gym for a small fee each school day. Students may come on campus at or after 9:15 am, without the need of our fee based care. Students who arrive before 9:15 am, become a part of our open gym at a cost to parents of $\$ 35$ for registration and $\$ 5$ per day that is attended.
